


Enjoying Lake Conroe After Stay-At-Home Orders Have Been Lifted

With stay-at-home orders being lifted, school ending early, and summer here, the number of boats on Lake Conroe waters increases every single day. The lake level is bobbing at 200 feet above mean sea level (msl), which is one foot down from the conservation pool level

of 201 feet msl. As always, with any level, there is the need to keep an eye out for water hazards. With the start of boating season, the San Jacinto River Authority (SJRA) wants to remind boaters of some basic water safety rules.

Covering all or part of seven counties, the organization’s jurisdiction includes the entire San Jacinto River watershed, excluding Harris County. The SJRA is one of two dozen river authorities in the State of Texas, and like other river authorities, its primary purpose is to implement long-term, regional projects related to water supply and wastewater treatment. SJRA receives no money from the state, nor does it collect any type of taxes.
